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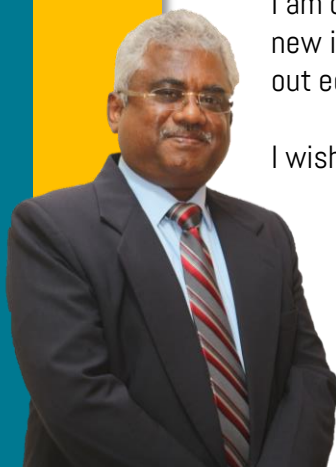
Dear Spicerians!

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First SAU Convocation



A long awaited and much cherished moment in the history of Spicer Adventist University - the first ever Convocation Ceremony was held on July 14th, 2019 in a packed Spicer House Prayer with distinguished guests; staff and faculty of the University, parents, students and most importantly the graduating class.

The outgoing class consisted of 465 graduates and postgraduates from six divisions. The Convocation Exercise comprising of guests, faculty, members of the governing body and the outgoing class was led by Shri. A. S. Verakkan, Controller of Examinations.

Dr. Sanjeevan Arsud, the Vice-Chancellor welcomed everyone in his opening remarks. The convocation attire was carefully designed and each department was given a different coloured gown, sash, cap and a medal. Shri. M. D. Shri. Ezras Lakra, President of the University declared the convocation open. The occasion was graced by many intellectuals and educators namely – Dr. (Padma Shri) S.B. Dr. M. Wilson, Executive Secretary, SUD, Shri. P. E. Selvin Moorthy, Treasurer, SUD and Dr. Jacob Daniel, renowned dental surgeon from Bangalore.

The President of the University Shri. Lakra challenged the graduating class to be Empowered to Serve as they go Onward, Forward and Upward. Dr. Mujumdar exalted the efforts of the University Administration in taking it to greater heights and also commended the graduating class.

The degree award ceremony was conducted by Dr. Yesu Simon, Registrar and the degrees were jointly conferred by the President and Vice-Chancellor respectively amidst loud applause. Dr. M. Wilson offered dedicatory prayer for the graduates with the closing prayer and benediction being offered by Shri. Selvin Moorthy.

The Convocation Ceremony came to an end by singing the National Anthem. As the graduates marched out and lined up outside the House of Prayer, elated parents, proud teachers and well-wishers congratulated each one of them.

Pleasantries were exchanged in an emotionally charged environment and thus bringing the much-anticipated Convocation Exercise to a happy end.

UGC TEAM VISITS SPICER



The University Grants Commission (UGC) team visited Spicer Adventist University from September 12-13, 2019. The ten-member committee was welcomed by the Nodal Officer for the UGC, Mr. M. D. John Moses and the Spicer family with lots of warmth and cheering. Spicer Administrators accompanied the guests to the auditorium while they were greeted by students from diverse backgrounds in their cultural attire. Once assembled in the auditorium the guests were felicitated and cultural programs performed in their honor.

On the first day, the team visited all the Divisions and respective Departments, interacting with the Deans, Head of Departments and teachers. They were impressed to find elaborate facilities and arrangements available. The visiting team lauded the Division of Arts and Social Sciences which offers courses in six faculties viz. Economics, English, Geography, History, Psychology and Sociology for implementing Choice Based Credit System (CBCS).

The museum at the Division of Sciences which exhibits fossils and specimens greatly impressed the UGC team. They also commended the Division for having qualified and motivated faculty who actively guide both undergraduate and graduate students to conduct laboratory research and write scholarly articles.

The Division of Education welcomed the team to visit their Curriculum and Activity Lab which holds resources for teaching aids and crafts used in training pupils. Greatly impressed by the meticulous attention to detail, members of the team signed congratulatory remarks on the visitors' board.

Division of Performing Arts and Division of Religious Studies also received praise for the orderly manner in which academics is being carried out. The Division of Business and Commerce was visited by the AICTE team where they interacted with the Dean and teachers and appreciated the facilities put in place for students.

The next day, the team interacted with the students, office staff and teachers separately. They were impressed with the commitment of the employees working at Spicer and also the support and admiration that students have for their alma mater. The UGC team left the campus with words of encouragement for the Administrators of the University for their selfless dedication in running an institution that strives to touch lives of the community.

IBE (AAA) INSPECTION FOR MASTER OF SCIENCE IN BOTANY AND BIOTECHNOLOGY OF THE DIVISION OF SCIENCES

The International Board of Education (IBE) representing the Adventist Accrediting Association (AAA) under the chairmanship of Dr. Mike Lekic, the Associate Director of the Department of Education at the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists visited Spicer from February 14-17, 2020 to evaluate the Master of Science Program in Botany and Biotechnology of the Division of Sciences. The Prime investigators were Dr. Joy C Kurian, Retired Science Professor at Asia Pacific International University, Thailand (via Skype) and Dr. Olutayo Shokunbi, an Assistant Professor at Babcock University in Nigeria from the department of Bio Chemistry. The other members of the team included Dr. R N Prabhu Das, the Director of Education at the Southern Asia Division of Seventh-Day Adventists and Mr. Anil Kandane, the Treasurer of the Western India Union of Seventh-Day Adventists.

The Dean of the Division of Sciences, Dr. Susan Thomas, along with input from the Administration and the assistance of Dr. Mohanraj Israel, campus Co-ordinator for AAA, prepared the proposal for both the programs. The evaluation process included interviews with the administration, the Division of sciences, the Dean of Sciences, the Librarian. Students and Faculty. The team also visited the Dean's office, the Faculty Room, the Conference Room, the Library Online resources, the Computer labs, the Science labs and the classrooms. The team also examined the Proposals to IBE, the minutes related to MSc in Botany, Responses to the Questionnaires, Updated Financial Projections, SAU's current financial reports, various resources for the new program and the University Bulletin. After two days of deliberations and individual writing of the reports, a final draft was prepared. The team then presented the exit report which included the Commendations on the two programs and the Recommendations to strengthen both programs.

Workshops for both students and faculty to help familiarize with research ethics and procedures and also planned for.

ATTENDANCE DEPARTMENT

Attendance in any institution, is very important. Studies prove that students who attend classes regularly are more likely to succeed in their academic performances. It is difficult for teachers and the classes to build their skills and progress if a large number of students are frequently absent. The institution's budget may also suffer when students don't attend classes. Moreover, if the attendance rate in an institution is low, other students would not want to register in that particular institute.

The attendance system in Spicer Adventist University is one of its kind. It is one of the most important aspects of this institution. A student is required to have a minimum of 75% attendance per semester. One academic year is divided into two semesters respectively. Failure to maintain the attendance results in the student not being able to write his/her final examination. Teachers are provided with individual attendance registers in which they mark the students' attendance on a daily basis. These registers are then submitted to the attendance office where they enter the data into the computer for the final report. Letters, SMS and Phone calls are sent/made to parents whose child's attendance is below average and a committee decides whether the student is eligible to appear for the final examination or not.

Tuesdays and Thursdays (9:30-10:30 am) have been set aside for Chapel exercises and club meetings respectively. Each student is allotted a seat number and is required to sit only on his/her seat during the chapel exercise, failure to do so will result in the student being marked absent. Attendance in the club meetings is taken by the assigned faculty or club President.

A four-day trip from January 16 to 19th to Diveagar was organized by the Department of Science

Academic Assessment Semester Report (2019-2020)

Assessment is an important part of student life. It helps students follow up and keep track of their learning progress. Spicer Adventist University has an assessment process which is done in two ways - Internal Examination and External Examination.

For the undergraduate programs, the Internal Examination accounts for 20 marks and External Examination for 80 marks respectively. Whereas for the graduate programs, Internal Examination accounts for 40 marks and External Examination 60 marks respectively.

The Internal Examination is conducted by the concerned faculties in their departments. While the External Examination is a collective assessment conducted at the end of every semester. The First Semester External Examinations of Spicer Adventist University for the Academic Year 2019-2020 were held from November 6 to 22, 2019.

The total number of students who appeared for the External Examinations was 755. The number of students who appeared for the first semester examination for respective faculties at the under graduate level are as follows:

Geoscience Resource Centre

Director's Report 2019

The Geoscience Resource Centre at Spicer Adventist University was inaugurated by Dr. James L. Gibson on September 16, 2019. There was a short talk and a special prayer before the opening of the centre. Although the designated space for the centre is one room, the whole Division of Science building has exhibits and posters on the Days of Creation and the Flood, including a model of Noah's Ark and a Dinosaur. A number of fossils collected from the Shivalik hills are also on display in the Division of Science. All the students and faculty of the Division of Science participated in this program providing an opportunity for the community to learn and share ideas and beliefs on issues related to Creation and the Flood. Dr. Gibson added to the fossil collection with Ammonites, a Trilobite, a shrimp and a fish. Dr. Gibson also supported the centre with a number of books as resource material. The students of the Philosophy of Science classes will be greatly benefitted by all the support given by GRI.

An International Conference on Faith and Science was organized on September 17 and 18 for the Division of Science and the Division of Religious Studies. The 12 presentations by Dr. James Gibson were informative and well presented. The Question-Answer Session was definitely inspiring with Dr. Gibson tactfully and honestly attempting to satisfy the curiosity of the 200 students as well as the faculty from both Divisions.

Creation Sabbath was the next platform for the Geoscience Resource Centre to promote the marvellous work of the Creator and the role of man to try and preserve the Earth. The weekend services, October 25, 26 were taken by the Division of Science. The students led out in the Friday evening Vesper service, and the Sabbath School program, while the faculty participated in the Divine Service. The theme was "He's got the whole world in His hands: The Intelligent Designer". On display in the lobby of the House of Prayer were fossils, corals and some interesting specimens which fascinated church members. A fellowship lunch for all the participants was highly appreciated.

2020 Plans for Geoscience Resource Centre at SAU

- The Centre hopes to conduct a Faith and Science Conference in September, 2020. Participants could include Science teachers from this and close by Unions.
- Creation Sabbath, 2020 will be celebrated with the whole Division of Science participating.
- It is also a plan of the Division of Science to organize a Science Day program and keep the Centre open for the students of Spicer Higher Secondary School.
- Resource personnel from the Centre hope to do 2 presentations on "Fossils and the Flood" and "Intelligent Design" at the nearby Hume McHenry School.
- A more challenging plan is to arrange for a fossil dig/collection in Gujarat for a few staff in November, 2020 or an opportunity to participate in the Dino Dig at Wyoming, June, 2020.

Department of History – A Report

1. Health Challenge 2020

The Health and Temperance Department of Spicer Adventist University Church organized a health benefit program – Health Challenge 2020.

The program is a 6-week long health challenge with three types of assessments. Firstly, the physical assessment through the KARADA Scan which measures the body composition such as the BMI, body fat, visceral fat; secondly, blood test (Lipid profile) which measures the fat content in our blood like cholesterol and triglycerides, and lastly, the nutritional assessment which tells how much food our body requires.

On completion of the assessment, we were assigned health goals based on the results. A health coach was assigned who helped participants fine-tune and personalize their health goals. I needed to gain more weight so my health coach recommended how much food I needed to eat for the week and what kind of exercise I had to do. My blood test reports were normal so I did not need to reduce cholesterol or triglycerides. However, some of my health mates were required to reduce their cholesterol levels and triglycerides.

I was given a booklet in which all my personal assessment was recorded. There was a section where daily food intake had to be logged. An app was used to calculate the calories consumed and to check if the goals were being met. Furthermore, a lifestyle chef shared recipes for healthy food preparation. We also had rigorous exercise routines and our health coach personally helped us to train in the gym.

At the moment, we are in the middle of the program and I have already gained 1 kg. Some of my health mates have lost 2 kgs. The participants have been very active with the exercise program, and are very careful with what they eat and drink. This program has been a real eye-opener!

Cervical Cancer Awareness Program

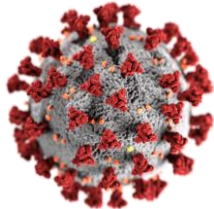

CORONAVIRUS: MYTHS & FACTS

A coronavirus is one of a number of viruses that cause diseases in mammals and birds. In humans, the viruses cause respiratory infections, including the common cold. The global Coronavirus pandemic is dominating the news these days. Unfortunately, this is also accompanied by several myths and misleading information. Let us take a look at a few common myths and facts relating to coronavirus:

Myth 1: Flu shots can prevent coronavirus.

Fact: Flu shots are not preventive against coronaviruses. There is no vaccine for coronavirus yet.

Myth 2: Traditional medicines can treat coronavirus.

Fact: Social media posts have touted natural remedies like gargling with salt water, eating garlic cloves or having some Chinese medicines as potential treatment options for coronavirus. However, such rumors need to be dispelled as according to Dr. Laxman, *"currently, there is no treatment available for coronavirus, nor any vaccine to prevent it."* (Dr Laxman Jessani, Consultant, Infectious Diseases, Apollo Hospitals, Navi Mumbai).

Myth 3: Healthy individuals are not at risk.

Fact: Many people believe that only those individuals with a weak immune system or with other respiratory issues are at risk of coronavirus. But everyone is at equal risk, even healthy individuals.

Myth 4: Transmission from bat soup.

Fact: A video of a woman eating bat soup has gone viral on the internet claiming that consumption of bat soup is the main reason behind the outbreak. But the video was shot four years ago. The transmission has been linked to snakes. *"Reports indicate that snakes were sold in the local seafood market in Wuhan, raising the possibility that the 2019-nCoV might have jumped from the host species, bats to snakes and then to humans at the beginning of this coronavirus outbreak. However, how the virus could adapt to both the cold-blooded and warm-blooded hosts remains a mystery,"* explains Dr. Laxman (Dr. Laxman Jessani, Consultant, Infectious Diseases, Apollo Hospitals, Navi Mumbai).

Myth 5: Hand dryers are effective in killing the new coronavirus.

Fact: No. Hand dryers are not effective in killing the 2019-nCoV. To protect yourself against the new coronavirus, you should frequently clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand rub or wash them with soap and water. Once your hands are cleaned, you should dry them thoroughly by using paper towels or a warm air dryer.

Myth 6: An ultraviolet disinfection lamp can kill the new coronavirus.

Fact: UV lamps should not be used to sterilize hands or other areas of skin as UV radiation can cause skin irritation.

Myth 7: Spraying alcohol or chlorine all over your body can kill the new coronavirus.

Fact: No. Spraying alcohol or chlorine all over your body will not kill viruses that have already entered your body. Spraying such substances can be harmful to clothes or mucous membranes.

Myth 8: Eating garlic helps to prevent infection with the new coronavirus.

Fact: Garlic is a healthy food that may have some antimicrobial properties. However, there is no evidence from the current outbreak that eating garlic has protected people from the new coronavirus.

Myth 9: The new coronavirus was deliberately created or released by people.

Fact: Viruses can change over time. Occasionally, a disease outbreak happens when a virus that is common in an animal such as a pig, bat or bird undergoes changes and passes to humans. This is likely how the new coronavirus came to be.

Myth 10: A face mask will protect you from COVID-19(Coronavirus).

Fact: Certain models of professional, tight-fitting respirators (such as the N95) can protect health care workers as they care for infected patients. But for the general public, the benefit of wearing lightweight disposable surgical masks is not clear. People with a respiratory illness can wear these masks to lessen their chance of infecting others.

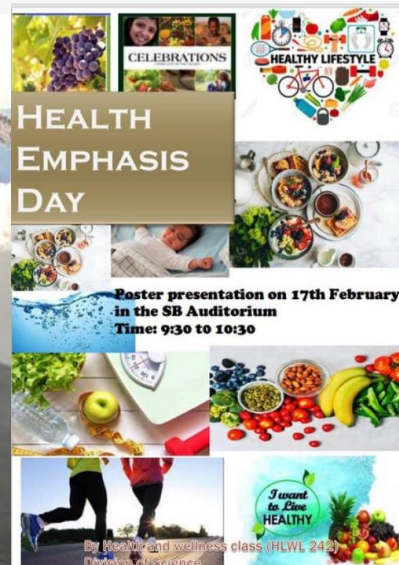

Higher, Further, Faster – Annual Sports, 2020

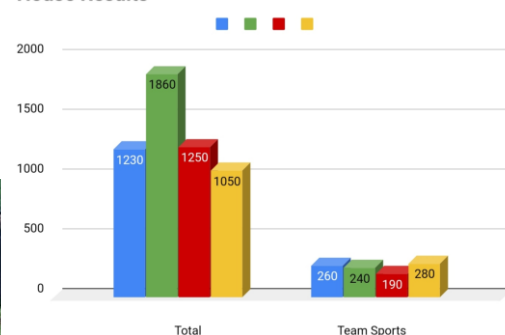
